He applied for citizenship status under the 1986 Agricultural Workers Amnesty, and helped many others apply for citizenship as well. Mr. Orozco obtained college and university degrees, as well as a multi subject teaching permit. Juan feels deeply indebted to the people of this country for all the opportunities and successes he has enjoyed.
